

# Wisconsin Association of Independent Colleges and Universities: Distributes \$66,000 in scholarships to students

Madison, Wis. – Oct. 12, 2017 – The Wisconsin Association of Independent Colleges and Universities (WAICU) has distributed \$66,000 in CIC/UPS Scholarships to assist 24 students at member private colleges and universities in Wisconsin. The scholarships were made possible by a grant from the Council of Independent Colleges (CIC) in Washington, DC, through the CIC/UPS Educational Endowment.

“At a time when college graduates are more critical to Wisconsin’s economy than ever, we are especially grateful to CIC and UPS for their partnership in making students’ aspirations in higher education a reality,” said Dr. Rolf Wegenke, president of WAICU.

Nationally, CIC and the UPS Foundation provided more than \$1.5 million in student scholarships through state-based associations to make private colleges and universities more accessible to underserved students.

“Independent colleges and universities in this country are remarkably effective at educating and graduating low-income and first-generation students in less time, with less student debt,” said Richard Ekman, president of CIC. “Helping these students afford a private college education is a truly critical need in our society, and it is rewarding to be a partner with the UPS Foundation and WAICU as we help to support deserving students.”

The CIC/UPS Scholarship Program has made a private college education possible for more than 20,000 low-income and first generation students and has had a transformative impact on individuals, families, and communities across the county.
