

Center for Research on the Wisconsin Economy: Forecast of 2018 Wisconsin, U.S. economic growth

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Forecast of 2018 Wisconsin, U.S. Economic Growth Released

UW-Madison Center for Research on the Wisconsin Economy predicts record low unemployment below 3%, positive economic growth for 2018

[Madison, Wis.] – Today, Noah Williams, the Juli Plant Grainger Professor of Economics at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, through the Center for Research on the Wisconsin Economy released his latest report with Junjie Guo, an economist at the Center. The pair today announced the release of, “[Forecasting the US and Wisconsin Economies in 2018](#)” and the corresponding, “[Outlook for the Wisconsin Economy in 2018.](#)”

Using a time series model to forecast economic activity, the report predicts that Wisconsin’s economy will grow by 1.6% in 2018, an acceleration from 2017. Notably, the report forecasts record low statewide unemployment dropping below even current historic levels, with a gain of roughly 40,000 jobs and unemployment rates falling below 3%.

“After years of a slow but steady recovery, economic growth has picked up speed recently. We forecast stronger growth in Wisconsin in 2018, with continued gains in the labor market and unemployment falling to a historic low,” said Noah Williams, report co-author and Director of the Center for Research on the Wisconsin Economy.

The CROWE report also suggests continued economic growth through 2018 at the national level with a corresponding decrease in the national unemployment rate. Overall, for both the United States and Wisconsin economies, the report concludes that 2018 will likely see a continuation of the current economic expansion with slightly stronger growth.
