These candidates earned our support and our votes for their commitment to passing policies to build worker power and raise wages and to ensure that Wisconsin can be a place where all can live with dignity and respect. In the months to come, our members look forward to mobilizing voters and doing all we can to support these candidates’ victory in November.”

Candidates endorsed by the SEIU Wisconsin State Council stated their commitment to key issues, including a \$15 minimum wage, restoration of union rights by repealing Act 10, and balancing the power between workers and bosses by creating sectoral bargaining tables. The service workers council also noted the candidates’ commitment to expanding BadgerCare and working toward guaranteeing healthcare for all as a right of every Wisconsinite, breaking down systemic racism, and tackling climate change by putting Wisconsinites to work in good, union jobs transitioning our state to a clean energy economy.

Throughout the pandemic, members of SEIU local unions have been the essential workers keeping the state running and providing critical care and services, and have also been at the forefront of fighting for policies that prioritize the health, safety, and economic well being of working people.

Not only have these candidates committed to supporting key legislative demands like the Healthcare Heroes Act, but they have also shown they have a plan to address public health and safety challenges and ensure that working peoples’ needs are met as the COVID-19 crisis continues, through the recovery and in the long-term.

For many months, SEIU WI State Council has spearheaded a voter engagement

program, which is focused on mobilizing, educating and turning out SEIU members, their families and their communities, while expanding the electorate by turning out infrequent Wisconsin voters. In the lead-up to November's General Election, members and volunteers will turn up the dial on voter engagement and Get Out the Vote efforts.
