

U.S. Sens. Johnson, Baldwin: Introduce Legislation to Rename Post Office After Einar Ingman

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OSHKOSH — U.S. Sens. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.) and Tammy Baldwin (D-Wis.) issued the following statements after introducing bipartisan legislation to rename a Tomahawk post office after Einar “Sarge” H. Ingman Jr., a Korean War veteran whose single-handed destruction of two machine gun nests near Maltari in 1951 allowed his squad to secure its objective.

“Einar ‘Sarge’ Ingman is a true American hero. No words can describe Sergeant Ingman better than his Medal of Honor citation which noted his ‘indomitable courage, extraordinary heroism, and superb leadership’ in his service to country. Renaming this Tomahawk post office in his honor is a fitting tribute to a man whose service and story should never be forgotten,” said Sen. Johnson.

“Einar Ingman’s strength and courage during the Korean War lives on through the freedoms we all cherish,” said Sen. Baldwin. **“I’m proud to do right by Mr. Ingman and his family by designating the Tomahawk Post Office building in his name. Einar was an American hero who should have his service and sacrifice to our nation honored.”**

The [bill](#) introduced by Sens. Johnson and Baldwin would officially change the name

of the post office at 311 W. Wisconsin Ave. in Tomahawk to the “Einar ‘Sarge’ H. Ingman, Jr. Post Office Building.” In 1951, President Truman awarded Sergeant Ingman the Medal of Honor for his courageous actions. Mr. Ingman was also recognized with two Purple Hearts, three Bronze Service Stars and various other recognitions. He passed away in September 2015.
