It's rippling through other parts of the state budget. Its tentacles are everywhere and we haven't come up with a solution."

And education has not been untouched. From delayed projects on UW campuses as transportation debt pushed out other capital projects to additional bus fleet maintenance for school districts, there is no such thing as a free ride.

Here is how deteriorating road conditions are increasing bus maintenance costs for the School District of West Salem, putting a strain on its budget:

- Shattered windows and windows fogging up due to lost seals
- Mirrors falling off
- Shocks busting loose from mountings
- Bent rims and alignment issues
- Damaged tires

Bus drivers need to drive well below the posted speed limits to curb excessive repairs. "You just can't travel safely at any kind of speed on these roads," said Troy Gunderson, superintendent of the School District of West Salem.

"It eats up our budget," Gunderson continued.

"Every time we have to redo the undercarriage of a bus, it's just one less computer, one less book or part of one less teacher we can have for our kids."
