This investment of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds for a 5% rate increase effective January 1, 2022, is one component of the rate reform initiative underway at the Department of Health Services.

This step builds on previous investments and will allow providers to begin to be more competitive as employers across Wisconsin. Currently, retention and recruitment of staff providing the full array of services to people with disabilities has never been more critical. DSPN will continue to work with all stakeholders involved in long-term care service delivery to elevate this profession and recognize and reward the dedicated staff serving our most vulnerable.
