REBECCA KLEEFISCH RETURNS TO LEAD 1848 PROJECT

"The 1848 Project is going to make sure people are prepared to run and then represent their neighbors in a responsible way, focused on fiscal conservatism, smaller government, and individual empowerment. Wisconsin deserves hardworking public servants who are prepared to lead."

Kleefisch, Wisconsin's former lieutenant governor, created the 1848 Project two years ago to develop the conservative agenda for Wisconsin's future. The 1848 Project released the Forward Agenda after holding listening sessions across Wisconsin.
