## 'Layers of (in)QUEER(y)' to be on view Oct. 18-Nov. 19

This month, the <u>Foster Gallery</u> at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire will present "Layers of (in)QUEER(y)."

The exhibition will be on view from Oct. 18-Nov. 19, with an opening reception from 6-7:30 p.m. Oct. 17, including refreshments and a pop-up library from UW-Eau Claire's McIntyre Library. All gallery events are free and open to the public.

"Layers of (in)QUEER(y)" is a student-curated queer art exhibition inspired by exploration in the HNRS 342 course, Honors Colloquium in Arts with Equity, Diversity, and Inclusivity, during fall 2023, which focused on queering and questioning the way we interpret art. The exhibition includes 13 national and local artists, interactive art experiences, workshops and a satellite alumni show at McIntyre Library.

At face value, it seems trivial to suggest that layering is a queer practice; everything is layered and more complex than it appears on the outside. However, as we delve into the subject, we see the inherent queerness in the process of layering.

Why do we yearn to delve deeper, to uncover the secrets of our identities, relationships and histories? One of our artists, Amaryllis Flowers, summed it up best, describing gallery exhibitions as a place for audiences to be "publicly curious." Please, be publicly curious as you traverse through our exhibition. Yearn to know more and discover the fruitful underbelly.
